

Overview

Spring Explorer is a perfect getaway for students to embrace that 'springtime' feeling and freshen up their language at our English countryside school, Bell St Albans. The course focuses on developing core English language skills through project-based learning activities and interactive learning - an effective way to learn language quickly and successfully. Our activity programme is also an integral part of the course and allows young learners to practice and develop what they have learnt in lessons.

On this course, students will:

- Develop their English in all four areas: reading, writing, listening and speaking
- ▶ Practise new vocabulary, pronunciation and improve their grammar structures, as appropriate to their level
- ▶Become confident, independent learners with essential 21st century life skills like: communication, critical thinking, collaboration, creativity and cultural awareness
- •Make friends with students from a diverse mix of countries across the globe

Who is this for?

Young learners who want to combine English language study with activities and educational day trips and excursions.

Our approach

English lessons

English lessons include projects that are designed around the school's weekly theme. Small groups of students work together on their projects based on the language knowledge and skills development needs.

Activity programme

Students at Bell 'learn by doing', so the activity programme is an integral part of the course and allows young learners to practise and develop what they have learnt in lessons. Our afternoon activities are designed to improve communication and confidence while developing academic, creative and active skills.

All Spring Explorer students will also enjoy a wide variety of whole-school evening activities, such as games, competitions, discos and shows.



Sample Study Tours

Students take part in one full-day study tour per week to a London-based venue, with a walking tour of the sites and time for shopping. Students staying longer than one week will also have a weekend excursion.

Students have the opportunity to add optional activities to enhance their experience, available on certain weeks only (see page 8 for more details)

- ▶Warwick explore the grounds of the medieval Warwick castle and wander through the historic streets of the town centre
- London see the London Eye, British Museum. Westminster Abbey, Natural History Museum, Science Museum or the Houses of Parliament
- •Cambridge or Oxford tour the city and university colleges, try punting along the river or visit one of the many world-class museums
- •Windsor discover a lively town in a glorious riverside location, best known for the Windsor Castle - one of the Queen's official royal residences and the largest and oldest occupied castle in the world.

Create a personal response





WEEK 1:

The City of Villages

SUNDAY 23 MARCH - SATURDAY 29 MARCH

In this project students will learn about the evolution of cities as hubs of culture, commerce, and community, focusing on the interplay between urban development and local identities. Students will be looking at the city of London through the lens of the past, present and future as their main study tour destination.

Example learning outcomes

- Students will learn vocabulary related to urban development and community dynamics and grammatical structures to describe cities e.g. present perfect tense to describe changes in urban areas over time.
- Students will learn functional language to discuss possibilities, suggestions, and obligations related to community development.
- Students will develop critical thinking skills through the analysis of socio-cultural impacts on urban planning and enhance their communication skills by presenting findings on community-based research projects.

Types of activities could include:

- •Read about local histories and listen to interviews with Londoners.
- •Compare and contrast the cultural traditions and festivals unique to urban communities.
- •Carry out a debate to design a community improvement plan focused on enhancing living conditions.

WEEK 2:

Sharing The Planet

SUNDAY 30 MARCH - SATURDAY 5 APRIL

In this project students will discover some amazing facts about the natural world and increase their awareness of global issues and the effects of human civilization on the planet. Students will be encouraged to explore global environmental challenges and design sustainable development plans by reflecting on their roles in preserving natural resources for future generations.

Example learning outcomes

- Students will learn vocabulary related to environmental issues and sustainability practices and grammatical structures to talk about current issues as well as make future predictions e.g. present simple and future
- Students will develop functional language to talk about consequences and speculate about hypothetical situations e.g. first and

WEEK 3:

They Changed The World

SUNDAY 6 APRIL - SATURDAY 12 APRIL

In this project, students will explore the lives and works of renowned writers like William Shakespeare and/or historical figures like Nelson Mandela. Students will learn more about how their contributions and will gain a deeper understanding of how powerful words and actions can leave a lasting legacy on society.

Example learning outcomes

- Students will learn vocabulary related to historical events and figures and grammatical structures to describe the life and/or the actions taken by influential figures e.g. past simple and/or continuous.
- Students will learn to analyse literary texts and speeches, identifying themes, rhetorical devices, and historical context.
- Students will enhance their confidence and fluency in public speaking by delivering presentations and performing dramatic interpretations of selected texts.

Types of activities could include:

- · Analyse key excerpts from Shakespeare's plays or Mandela's speeches to understand the meaning words can carry.
- · Listen to a recorded biography about an influential figure and complete a gapped text based on the information provided.

WEEK 4: Kings & Queens

SUNDAY 13 APRIL - SATURDAY 19 APRIL

In this project the students will learn about the history, traditions, and cultural significance of monarchy in different societies. Students will be encouraged to examine the roles and responsibilities of royalty, their impact on national identities, and the evolution of monarchies in the modern world.

Example learning outcomes

- Students will learn specialized vocabulary related to monarchy and royal traditions and grammatical structures to talk about life events e.g. narrative tenses.
- Students will learn functional language to speculate on how different decisions by kings and queens might have changed history e.g. the third conditional form (B2).
- ⊘ Students will develop critical-thinking skills by evaluating the historical and contemporary roles of monarchs as well as enhance their cultural awareness and sensitivity through comparative studies of royal institutions worldwide.

Types of activities could include:

- · Research the lives and legacies of influential monarchs throughout history.
- Create a timeline of key events in the history of monarchy in different countries.
- · Compare and contrast constitutional monarchy versus other forms of government.



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WEEK 5:

Nation of Innovation

SUNDAY 20 APRIL - SATURDAY 26 APRIL

In this project students will learn about innovation and technological advancements that have shaped societies and transformed industries. Students will be encouraged to explore the role of creativity, entrepreneurship, and scientific discovery in driving progress and addressing global challenges.

Example learning outcomes

- Students will learn technical vocabulary related to innovation and entrepreneurship and grammatical structures to make prediction about future innovations e.g. future tenses.
- Students will learn functional language to speculate about the potential impact of future innovations e.g. modals of possibility and probability.
- O Students will enhance their problemsolving skills through hands-on projects and simulations.

Types of activities could include:

- · Collaborate on a tech innovation challenge to solve real-world problems.
- · Read about the impact of artificial intelligence on the world of education.
- · Listen to a documentary about sustainable technologies.




220-240V, 50Hz AC. UK-type 3-pin plugs are used.
